Margee Louisias (MD, MPH) is a pediatric and adult Allergist-Immunologist and a health-services researcher in community-based interventions to reduce racial disparities in pediatric asthma. She is an Assistant Professor of Medicine at Harvard Medical School, an Associate Physician and Director of Equity and Inclusion in the Division of Allergy and Clinical Immunology; and an Assistant Program Director for Racial Justice and Equity of the Internal Medicine Residency Program at Brigham and Women's Hospital. Dr. Louisias received her undergraduate degree in chemistry from New York University, medical degree from Stony Brook University School of Medicine, and MPH at the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health. She completed her Allergy and Immunology fellowship at Brigham Women's Hospital in 2016, where she also did a joint fellowship in pediatrics health services research and quality improvement. She is a board-certified Internist, Pediatrician, and Allergist-Immunologist. Dr. Louisias is recognized locally and nationally through honors and awards granted from her specialty organization and home institution; and publications on asthma, structural racism, and physician advocacy. Her other interests include quality improvement, implementation science, community engagement, translation of research into policy, and the role of racism in health outcomes/patient safety, and workforce diversity.
